



Bag a bargain

As the end of the financial year looms, consumers stir from their wintery doldrums and tackle the sales - or do they? For the last 5 years, SA total (original) retail turnover has decreased during June. The June 2012 retail turnover was \$20 million or 1.4% less than the previous month.

However, when looking at this data by industry, some interesting patterns are revealed. Supermarket and grocery stores are the main retailers who missed out in June, trading 3.8% less in June 2012 than in the previous month. Clothing and footwear retailers were also disappointed over the last 5 years, with an average downturn of around \$10 million, or 9.6%.

However, retailers selling furniture, home wares and textiles, and electrical/electronic goods increased their turnovers from May to June. In 2012, these retailers sold \$10.3 million more in June than in the previous month. End of year prices on new cars also seem to tempt consumers, with June 2012 new vehicle sales 21.6% higher than those in May.

So while South Australia's overall retail sector experiences a decline in June, spending patterns on household items, such as furniture and electrical goods, and motor vehicles defy this trend (cat. no. 8501.0).

ABS.Stat is where it's at

ABS.Stat is a free interactive online tool that presents data in a searchable, flexible and dynamic way, allowing users to create and export custom tables.

It can be accessed via a web browser interface, where you can view, query and download data; and a web services interface, which allows machine-to-machine sharing of data. A **number of datasets** are now available in ABS.Stat.

ABS.Stat is currently in beta testing, allowing you to preview it and provide the ABS with feedback as we work to enhance the tool.

Would you like to know more about the whole **National Accounts** and **State Accounts** shebang?

Q: Why doesn't the ABS produce interstate trade statistics?

A: We would if we could! But as yet the gentle art of producing reliable interstate trade estimates and measuring changes to state producers' inventories eludes us*. Any attempt to derive gross state product figures on the basis of known expenditure (GSP(E)) is therefore incomplete.

Luckily, there's a workaround. GSP(E) is assumed to be equal to the gross state product that is derived on an income basis (GSP(I)), and a derived balancing item is added. The balancing item is an imputed figure representing both interstate trade and changes in inventories.

So, for seekers of interstate trade estimates, that's the best we can do. For a more detailed explanation, check out National Accounts:
